

Foreword

Nunavik is the northernmost region of Québec. Although this region comprises close to a third of the province, little data exists on the socio-economic characteristics of its population. It is generally difficult to obtain Nunavik-specific statistics from statistics agencies and few summary statistics are available. The publications *Nunavik at a Glance* 1999 and 2007 produced by the Makivik Corporation and *Tendances nordiques - Les changements sociaux, 1970-1990, chez les Cris et Inuit du Québec: une enquête statistique exploratoire* by Jean-Jacques Simard are exceptions¹. The goal of the present compilation is to provide better statistical coverage on Nunavik with the main socio-economic data available.

The tables appearing in this pocket edition are simplified versions of some of the tables contained in *Nunavik in Figures 2015 – Full Version*². Readers are referred to the unabridged document for a complete list of sources and methodological notes. *Nunavik in Figures 2015 – Full Version* is available on Nunivaat.org, along with the tables contained in this data base.

All tables are based on the latest available data for Nunavik. Some of the data is doubtless not the most recent.








2.4 Population by five-year age groups, 2011






Number of children in married or common-law couple families, 2011




Type of census families, 2011



2.6 Fertility rate, 1994-1998, 1999-2003 and 2004-2008




2.7 Life expectancy at birth, 2000-2003 and 2005-2008






















6.1 Income of the total population aged 15 and older, 2010











8.1 Private dwellings, 2011




8.2 Dwellings requiring major repairs, 2001, 2006 and 2011


